The Baron and Baroness presented Lion's Claws to: HL Aine Inghean ui Chonchobhair and Mistress Katherine atte Moure. *




Figure 1. Accessed at http://www.gutenberg.org/files/12254/12254-h/images/illus046.jpg



Paper Making

Lady Ceara inghean uí Mhadadháin



Description:

Hand-made paper and the process of making it

Culture and time period:

Paper is credited to the Chinese for its invention in 105 AD (2). Although the word "paper" comes from the word "papyrus", papyrus isn't a true paper. Papyrus was made initially by the Egyptians by weaving softened reeds of the papyrus grass then pounded thin and dried. Papyrus is actually a woven mat, not paper. Parchment and vellum is made from animal skins. A true paper is made of pulped fibres, which was typically from plant fibres (mulberry bark, bamboo, etc.), linen or cotton.

It took time for the technology of papermaking to spread to the Western world of Europe and it was largely attributed to wartimes. In 751 AD, several Chinese papermakers were captured by Islamic warriors and then whisked away to form the would-be papermaking hub in Samarkand. The time of the Crusades during the 12th Century is when papermaking finally arrived in Europe. (2)

It wasn't until 1690 that papermaking, as we know it today, made its way from Europe to America. The first paper mill was constructed in 1691 in Roxbourough, Philadelphia by William Rittenhouse and his printing partner, William Bradford. (1)

The way they did it:

The pulp that was needed for the process was a labourintensive process. Ts'ai Lun, the inventor, took the inner bark from the mulberry tree along with bamboo, soaked it in water to soften it then pounded it with a wooden tool to create the pulp. The pulp was then poured onto a coarsely woven cloth to allow the fibres to settle and the water to strain through. Once it was dry, the resulting leaf of paper was ready for writing upon. (2)

The process that is being imitated for my project is a little newer in technology than that created by Ts' ai Lun. This process used a mould and deckle. The deckle shapes the paper while the mould holds the mesh used to capture the fibres in the pulp.

To create the pulp, rags of linen were left in a vat with a little water to rot for a few days. Once the fibres were sufficiently loosened, the rags were fed into a stamping mill

which broke apart the fibres to create the pulp. Two people were needed to create the paper. The first person was the vatman and his job entailed taking the mould and deckle, dipping it in the vat of pulp then lifting it to allow the water to drain away and form the leaves of paper. The coucher would remove the newly made paper from the mould onto felt and stack them for pressing. Once a



stack of leaves was large enough, they were pressed using screw press to squeeze out as much water as possible. A third worker, the layman, was responsible for removing the felt between the leaves of paper and neatly stacking it so that it could be pressed again and again until it was ready to be hung for drying. Once dried, the paper needed to be sized if it was going to be used for writing. Sizing treats the paper so that inks would not bleed. To do this, the paper was dipped into a liquid made from boiled bits of parchment or leather shavings. After the paper had dried, it was burnished with a smooth stone to create the writing surface. (3)

The way I did it and why:


Materials: Largely, the reasons I chose the method I used was due to materials that were available to me and within my non-existent budget. Time was also a factor. The frames for the mould and deckle were made out of wood scraps that I found in my husband's shop. They were glued together then stapled to provide additional stability. By happenstance, there was some mesh in my husband's shop as well however it was much too narrow so I bound two strips together using thread. For pulp, I simply used some paper that was lying around for recycling.

Procedure: To make a pulp, the paper was shredded then soaked in some warm water for approximately 2 hours (rotting). This mixture was then fed into the blender (stamping mill) to break up the pieces and create the pulp. Since I had some size issues with my bin/tray for holding the mould and deckle, I simply placed the mould and deckle into my bin and poured the pulp into the mould. After letting it sit for a moment, the mould and deckle were removed from the bin and the deckle was then taken off to reveal the pulp. A piece of felt was laid over the paper then flipped over so that the excess water could be sponged away through the mesh on the mould (couching). Once most the water was squeezed out, the mould was removed and the wet paper exposed. This process was repeated a few times, with each successive leaf of paper being layered between the felt. When the stack was finished, a weight was placed on top so that it could press more water out as it dried. After a short period, the paper was then removed from the stack and laid out to dry.
