Ultimately, we do have to suck it up. On Movember 1, I shaved off my moustache. The Movember Movement (http://ca.movember.com/) is a visible way to bring attention to men's health issues specifically cancers that affect men. To all those currently undergoing treatment or have recently undergone treatment, my love and prayers go out to you.

Baroness' Tourney Report

The Lions Gate Baroness' Tourney XLVI was very enjoyable.

Baron James Wolfden's crossbow shoot with mini targets and ferocious beasts was great fun and very, very well attended with dozens of the populace trying their hand. Blasting a beast with a bolt meant munching on chocolate! The fencing was wonderful to watch, especially the London Masters portion using all the different weapon combinations. I heard there was a formidable field of fighters as well. The arts and sciences challenges run by the Arts and Science Minister Lady Myrrim de Lancaster showed great creativity. The "Horse in any Medium" resulted one entry that was a picture of a horse inside a soothsaying medium! There were also games, games, everywhere as both I and Gamesmistress Mary Ostler brought games for the populace to enjoy. The wood burning games project the Honourable Lady Mary has been working on is truly spectacular and is nearly complete.

At evening court as deputy Baronial Archer, I was given to honour to acknowledge a number of Lions Gate archery achievements this year, including the current standing of 21 top 10 placements in the Royal Rounds and York Rounds by our 21 archers, as well as Arcos Aline de Seez attaining the level of Grand Master.

Improvement and involvement in archery in Lions Gate are recognized with the Golden Bolt for crossbow, and the Golden Pierced Arrowhead for archery. I was delighted to announce that my co-deputy of Archery in Lions Gate, Archos Kenneth of Shaftesbury, earned the Golden Bolt for this year. The real bolt currently resides far across the water in the Shire of Hartwood (no doubt in a moving box somewhere!), as the previous year's recipient was Master John MacAndrew, whose family moved on November 1st. Negotiations for it's return are anticipated to complete soon. In the meanwhile, Arcos Kenneth as given as a token of holding the "Golden Bolt", a golden fletched blunt for one of the mini-crossbows, the presentation of which garned much mirth.

The members of the Lions Gate Company of Archers were also announced, being Arcos Kenneth of Kenneth of Shaftesbury and newlyl-fledged Arcos David of Tiriane. The Lions Gate Company of Archers is a way to recognize those archers who strive for breadth of skill by using at least four different types of weapons, in a variety of tournament and round formats. It is a worthy challenge, and one that must be striven for anew every year. Upon first successfully meeting the criteria of the Company, the new member is awarded a period arrow, with hand-tied fletching and a cast bodkin point. There after, the archer may crest their arrow with a single band of silver for each year of entry into the Company, or a gold band if they attain the highest scores for the year and earn the rank of Captain of the Company.

At the end of the evening, those who chose to stay for the potluck banquet were rewarded by seating at an intimate collection of tables and with a variety of fabulous dishes to try.

Thank you to Mistress Caitrin and her team for creating a special event that was warm and welcoming, despite her having a cold, a spectacular selection of royals to attend to, and juggling two locations.

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Ask Our Alchemist



Dear Dr. Carus,

At twenty-five and having yet to find my prince, I am starting to despair that I will remain a spinster. However, most of the advice I have read seemingly involves various unfortunate forms of footwear. Just how practical are these "glass slippers," and how would I have a pair made?

Barefoot and confused, Tootsies Zapato

My Lady Zapato,

In a previous article [1], Dr. Carus (who is starting to quote himself, on top of speaking of himself in the third person) had occasion to mention the legend of *vitrum flexile* – glass that is not only transparent and incorruptible, but that on being struck

would flex or dent instead of shatter [2]. As you can imagine, this would be a useful property for shoes worn for dancing, which (he understands) often involves much hopping and skipping about, and repeated foot-floor impacts (and occasional foot-foot crushings).

Unfortunately, glass as we know it is a notoriously brittle substance – though lately (1625) the Dutch have developed curious drops that can withstand being smashed by a hammer (but explode into dust if their tails are tweaked); later (ca 1650) they'll be introduced by Prince Rupert, the flamboyant cavalier and inventor, to King Charles II of England, who'll use them for practical jokes, and eventually (1661) suggest them as one of the first subjects of study by his newer toy, the Royal Society – who knows but that one day someone (François Royer de la Bastie of France, 1874 [3]) might not turn this idea into large plates or articles of "toughened" or "tempered" glass, with many uses.

But alas! Even if glass were not brittle, it is still rigid, and such hypothetic ballroom lower garb – like existing wooden shoes or pattens – would perhaps limit the Lords and Ladies to clog-dancing (and possibly encourage the savage and forbidden custom of clog-fighting [4]) – though certain Period manuals [5] suggest that elegant dance is even possible in foot-tall platform *chopines* (though usually of cork; presumably, some time after learning to walk in these unaided).

Some "debunkers" have suggested that the whole idea of "glass slippers" may have been an error in Perrault's version of "Cinderella" [6] – itself adapted ultimately from the original romance-by-shoe story of Rhodopsis of Egypt [7], with added specification of the podalic material – involving a confusion of *verre* / "glass" for *vair* / "a fine patterned fur such as from certain squirrels" [8]. Others [9, 10], though, have derided this hypothesis as an unlikely mistake for a member of *l'Académie Française* to make, being unhistorical (furry footwear being generally undocumented), contrary to independent versions of the folktale in other languages, and inconsistent with the plot. The need for a close fit makes more sense with a rigid structure; she would have been used to servants' clogs, when she went to the Ball disguised as herself – the true Lady of the Manor. They're magic fairy slippers anyway – what, the carriage really came from a *citron* instead of a *citrouille*, too? (might explain why vehicles that soon become inoperable came to be called "lemons")

Unlike the carriage that reverted to a pumpkin at midnight, Cinderella's slippers seem to have been of a form and substance that could survive indefinitely without need of ongoing magical sustainment. One could speculate about materials as transparent but tougher than glass, such as a colourless version of amber, or resins like shellac or lacquer (harvested via the Lac Bug, and from which an entire palace is said to have been built [11]), or gums or "drying" oils (ex.linseed oil/lin-oleum), that are known to be tough and relatively clear in thin coatings of varnish, and perhaps could be built up in multiple layers, or moulded like soft wax or other "plastic" material.

Well, as usual, Alchemy has its work cut out for it. Meanwhile, I wish everyone a happy upcoming (Christmas) Ball Season, *et pacem in terris*. And, my Lady, may I urge you also to keep an open mind towards the possibility of an alternative lifestyle, and consider whether you might not have a vocation for a career of scholarship and quiet contemplation. I know my sisters of the female branch of our order – the Benedictine nuns – are always looking for new recruits to carry on their good works. There's no life like it!

Barony of Lions Gate Archery Report July 2011

Practices

Now that monsoon season has lessened, archery practices are taking place three times a week at the Burnaby Butts: Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays. Attendance is usually low, with between two and six archers each day, though who shows up each day varies considerably. Kenneth of Shaftesbury has continued this year to be a stalwart presence on the range, missing only a few days due to rain. Most of the new archers from the winter have chosen not to purchase Burnaby Archer's memberships, so attendance has fallen accordingly.

The rules at the Burnaby Butts have changed this year, and I've been keeping busy enforcing them. Membership checking is part of this. Other changes include:

* restricting archers to shooting and retrieving within the width of the shooting lane when the butts on either side are being used

* coaching new archers at closer distances until their accuracy improves, before beginning Royal Rounds (this reduces frame damage to the butts)

* not running York rounds unless two butts to either side are clear (although no York Rounds have taken place yet this year)

* moving the practice to the west side of the range on Tuesdays, so that the Burnaby Archery classes can make use of the right side of the field (as they mostly shoot at shorter distances and longer distance shooters are now restricted to west side of the field.)

I've also been informing people via the Yahoo archery list when I hear of maintenance parties at the range. I feel the archers could do more than we have done, so I'll be expanding the postings to Facebook. Not all archers are on the Yahoo list.

One thing that may help is having the current practice dates listed on the Baronial Calendar. I have emailed the Web Mistress to request this be done.

Combat Archery

The combat archery group continues to grow and gain strength and prowess. They did a fine job at Sealion War in June. More CA authorizations have been completed this month, and a few more are pending in the next week or two. Don Warwick Drakkar and Lady Elora have been instrumental in keeping the momentum going. Warwick and Elora held two combat arrow making workshops in July, thanks to which I am now the proud owner of 48 green, sparkly missles of death! There were 15 orders of arrows or bolts created through the workshops, so Lions Gate combat archers will be well-equipped.

Children's Archery

Elaine won the moose shoot at Stranded Mermaid, and my daughter Asari won the overall archery event (and placed third in the adult event!) I am considering a few ways to set up regular coaching for children so that more may learn the joy of archery.

Archery at Tournament of Armies

I have offered and been granted the honour of being the MIC for the Tournament of Armies this year. There will be ten different scenarios over two days, including a children's competition, as well as open range time at this premier archery event for the barony. I'm looking forward to many archers coming from across Tir Righ and An Tir.

Combat arrow failures

The round of combat arrows made recently is in the process of being fixed. Some analysis has been done, much of it by William Arwemakre, and the flaws discovered are being corrected. The information is being distributed through Facebook, where the original group of arrow makers came together. Baron James was asked to check the arrows at the recent Odin's event in Lionsdale.

Archery practice over the winter

With the fight practice having to relocate, target archery will not be able to join in due to space and safety limitations. The coverall with its fabric walls might be damaged or punctured by stray arrows (which might continue onwards and present a serious safety issue.) The Alice McKay building is too small to hold fighters are rapier and target archers. It may be large enough to hold combat archery practices.

I will be publishing regular outdoor target archery practices on Saturday or Sunday mornings at the Burnaby Butts. Practices will take into account mundane tournaments, local SCA events, and all attendees will have to be members of the Burnaby Archery Association. Instead of paying \$5 per practice, archers will pay \$60 for the full year (family memberships are \$100 for up to 3 people, \$15 for each addition person.)

Archery year end and Company of Archers

The end of the archery year is coming up on October 31st. I'll be holding Saturday and Sunday special

shoots each weekend, with the same considerations as above. Specifically, IKAC (Interkingdom Archery Competition) and York rounds (long distance shoot; takes about 3 hours.) These will be of particular importance for those archers trying out for the Company of Archers. I'll send out an email to the lists about the company next week, to remind the populace about it, are describe the current criteria.

Archery classes

Starting this winter, I want to begin holding archery classes in Lions Gate, perhaps one per month. These can be held at events, or can be held informally from my home (for smaller groups.) I will discuss the idea with the Baron and Baroness, keeping the TUTR program of archery classes originally drawn up by Baroness Margaret as the area of focus. I hope to encourage intructors to come forward, and may finally have convinced William Arwemakre to teach a course on making combat arrows. I'll also be holding some arrow repair and arrow making workshops through the winter so everyone is ready to go by spring.

Burnaby Butts - volunteer opportunities

William Arwemakre has let me know there will be a maintenance party at the Burnaby Butts in October, most likely October 23rd. I'll be inviting Lions Gate archers to pitch in and help out. Virtually all of the field maintenance is done by volunteers to keep the cost down (and of the memberships) so I feel we should pitch in and do our part. Lady Winifred and I also help out running the ticket sales and the concession at the 3D shoots several times a year as a gesture of good will.

Baronial archery stock

There is a receipt from Kenneth of Shaftesbury for his recent purchase of targets for the Barony, which I'll turn over to the Exchequer for a cheque to reimburse him.

Archery in the Barony

Archer participation in Bows and Blades in the Barony of Vulkenfeldt was good. At least four target archers attended, and informal reports are that everyone had a great time, and a number of archers placed very well. Archos Kenneth of Shaftesbury sent out a detailed description of the event to the lists.

The archery season is wrapping up for Royal Rounds. October has been an archery blitz month, with three or four practices held every week, run by Arcos Kenneth of Shaftesbury and myself. It has been a great year for target archers, with several archers achieving personal bests, and more making it into the medallion rankings in the top ten lists-21 medallions as of the end of the October. For personal bests in particular, Archos Aline de Seez earned her Grand Master in Open.

I will be continuing to hold special weekend shoots throughout the winter, hopefully at least once per month, at the Burnaby Butts. Dates will be posted to the lists, and will be weather dependent. The practices will take into account any local, Tir Righ or Kingdom events. Let's see the archers keep their scores up this winter!

Winter Practices

Discussions are continuing with Academie Duello. Devon Boorman (Don Prospere de Montsegur) is interested in welcoming SCA archers to a new, drop-in target archery practice held at the Academie's hall in downtown Vancouver. The most likely date will be a Sunday, in the early evening for an hour or two. I've asked Don Prospere if he will try to meet the current practice fee rate of \$5 per practice. I'll post information about the new indoor practice once details are settled.

I would like to ask Council on their opinion for a temporary lending of the barony's archery nets to the Academie until such time as they order their own. It takes time for the bulky nets to be shipped, and lending our nets in the interim would allow the new practice to begin sooner.

Burnaby Archery Club (Burnaby Butts practice range) Annual General Meeting The Burnaby Archery Club held their Annual General Meeting. Archos Kenneth of Shaftesbury and myself attended, along with the Honourable William Arwemakere, who is the Field Director for the Club. The Club's membership numbers are up 100 over the past year, an increase of one third. This good news means the membership fees will not increase for the upcoming year.

The city of Burnaby's plan to move the archery field west, across the roadway, will be happening but not for a number of years. The city will be asking for input from the Club when planning for the new range begins. The dates for the tournaments and 3D shoots next year will be posted soon on the board at the range. I requested the archery field maintenance party dates also be posted on the board after the dates are known, so that SCA archers can plan to attend. There will be two major maintenance parties, in spring and fall. We need more SCA archers to participate in these work parties. If you can stuff plastic bags into bigger plastic bags, or wrap zip ties, you can contribute. There are 3D shoots held several times per year, and a helping out at the concession stand that runs at the 3Ds is another great way to assist the Club, which is what Lady Lady Wymarcha Doiron and myself did a few times this past year. The Burnaby Archery Club is a non-profit organization run by volunteers, similar to the SCA, and like the SCA, many hands make light work.

A concern was raised about steel points from wooden shafts being left behind in the donnaconna fibre matts in the butts, where they can, and are, hit by other arrows. One modern archer lost two arrows (at \$20 apiece) during a recent tournament due to hitting buried points. Glue can fail, so it is always a good idea to carry a push rod in your archery kit, something strong but narrower than the arrow shaft. I'll be posting this suggestion to the lists next month.

SCA archers have been helping to keep the range safer by looking for and removing metal points left stuck in the wood frames of the butts (from both wood shafts and carbon shafts.) These can be a hazard if they have ragged edges.
